Leadership in nursing is conceptualized as occurring in three primary domains: in clinical practice with patients and staff, within healthcare institutions and professional organisations, and in healthcare policymaking areas. Powerful leadership is deemed important to face the challenges of current nursing care. It might lead to superior performances in clinical practice, thereby delivering benefits to those involved in the delivery or receipt of care. This conference will address different aspects of leadership in nursing, as well as the evidence based perspectives on this topic. This international conference will allow lively discussions and debates on challenges and opportunities for leadership in nursing in a global perspective.

Keynote speakers

Professor Dr. Thóra B. Hafsteinsdóttir is an Associate Professor of Nursing, Department of Nursing Science at the University of Utrecht and an Associate Professor of Nursing, Allied Health Care for people with chronic illnesses at the University of Applied Sciences, Utrecht, the Netherlands, and she is a Visiting Professor of Nursing, Faculty of Nursing, at the University of Iceland. Thóra supervises various research projects, focusing on nursing care and management of patients with stroke, nursing leadership, nursing management, leadership mentoring. Only recently, she received an Erasmus Plus grant for her research proposal, entitled 'Nursing Leadership Educational Program for Doctoral and Postdoctoral Nurses in Europe'.



Dr. Julie Repper is Director of Implementing Recovery through Organisational Change (ImROC), an organisation hosted by the Nottinghamshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust (UK). ImROC works in partnership with communities to develop systems, services and cultures that support recovery and wellbeing for all. Julie is also Recovery Lead at Nottinghamshire Healthcare Trust and Associate Professor of Recovery at University of Nottingham. She draws on her experience of working as a nurse, manager, researcher and lecturer, as well as her personal experience of using mental health services, to support greater understanding of Recovery. She works across service boundaries with people who use services, providers, commissioners and academic institutions to support collaborative approaches in facilitating Recovery.



Claudia Maier is a policy analyst in health systems and health workforce at Technische Universität Berlin and consultant with the WHO Regional Office for Europe. Prior to this, Ms. Maier worked in the Department of Evidence, Innovation, and Policy at UNAIDS on country investment cases on efficiency, sustainable financing and task-shifting. In her earlier career, Claudia was a technical officer at the European Observatory on Health Systems and Policies, where she worked on the E.U.-funded PROMeTHEUS research project, a cross-country analysis of health professional mobility in the European region, and organized policy dialogues on health policy reforms across the region.

Travel information

By plane

- **Brussels Airport (67 km from Ghent)**

The easiest way to get to Ghent is by train. There are direct trains from the airport to Ghent (Ghent Central Railway Station = Gent-Sint-Pieters). Another option is to take the train from the airport to Brussels Central Station, and switch to another train to Ghent (Ghent Central Railway Station = Gent-Sint-Pieters). Travel time is about 1 hour and the price for a single fare is approximately €16.00. More information can be retrieved here.

- **Brussels South Charleroi Airport (111 km from Ghent)**

The fastest way to get to Ghent is by bus. Bus services are provided by the private company Flibco. Travel time is about 1h20' and the price for a single fare is approximately €15.00. The bus arrives in front of the Ghent Central Railway Station. More information can be retrieved here.

By train

Ghent is easy to reach by train from all Belgian and European cities. The station is close to the congress venue. Ghent is a 30-minute train ride from Brussels, 45 minutes from Antwerp, 50 minutes from Liège and 1 hour from the Belgian coast. Your train journey from Ghent to Brussels South Station takes just half an hour. If you take the Eurostar or the Thalys you can be in Paris in 1.5 hours and in London, Amsterdam or Cologne in 2.5 hours.

By car

Ghent is located at the junction of two important motorways: the E40 and the E17. You can park on the parking of the Ghent University Hospital (10€/day).

By public transportJuly 11, 2018

Ghent University Hospital can be reached by tram 4, bus line 5, 8, 67, 65. Map out your route via [de website van De Lijn](#).

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The campus of Pharmaceutical Sciences can be reached with bus line 8 (stop Heymanslaan), 67 and 65 (stop UZ Ottergemsesteenweg). From Ghent Sint-Pietersstation, you can walk to the faculty (20 min), or take tram 4 to the Ghent University Hospital (UZ) and get off at the terminus. From the terminus, you can walk to the faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences. At the roundabout, you can enter through the green gate and walk around the building to reach the main entrance of the faculty.
